Internships

Paid or unpaid (by industry)

Credit or no credit

Short-term

Part-time or full-time

Co-ops

Paid

May have to take 1 or more quarters off

Longer-term

Typically full-time



Criteria to be considered an internship on Handshake

- Must be a learning experience that provides the opportunity to apply knowledge gained in the classroom
- The skills/knowledge must be transferable to other settings
- The experience has a defined beginning and end
- There are clearly defined learning objectives/goals related to the professional goals of the student
- There is supervision by a professional with educational and/or professional background in the field of the experience
- There is routine feedback by the experienced supervisor
- Resources, equipment, and facilities are provided by the employer to support learning objectives/goals



How to secure academic credit

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- How Do I Receive Academic Credit?

At UCR, students can apply for academic credit or do the internship simply for professional development.

To receive academic credit for an internship or employment that aligns with your academic goals, you must complete the following steps at any point before the quarter for which you are seeking credit and no later than two weeks after the quarter has started.

Before starting, we recommend you review this instructional video.

1. Secure an internship or employment.

 Determine whether your major department offers a 198-I, 298-I, or 398-I course and if your internship meets eligibility for credit within your major. If not, work with your academic advisor to identify a related department that offers a 198-I, 298-I, or 398-I course (refer to the <u>UCR General Catalog</u> or talk to an instructor that will sponsor you).

Why are internships important?

Because it is an influential attribute for employers

"... when employers have equally qualified candidates, they choose the candidate with internship experience. Candidates who have completed an internship with a hiring organization have a slight edge over those with internship experience in a given industry, but." both attributes show the highest influence ratings in choosing one candidate over another." **Choosing Between Equally Qualified Candidates**

How are employers looking for interns?



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Recruitment time

On average, employers start recruiting 5-8 months before the internship program starts.

Search methods

Career fairs, information sessions, and posting opportunities online are the most popular and most effective methods for employers.

Selecting top candidates

Between equally qualified candidates, students who have held a leadership position, major, and involvement were more likely to be chosen.
