## WHAT, WHY, & HOW?

### What Is an Internship?

- Provides an opportunity to help you "test drive" a possible career path.
- Allows you to connect your academic experience with the professional work world.
- Can be paid or unpaid, part-time or full-time, and for credit or no credit.

### Why Intern?

- Gives a competitive edge in employment after graduation.
- Helps in career decision-making.
- Facilitates networking contacts.
- May provide financial assistance.
- May allow you to receive academic credit.
- Learn elective job search, resume writing, and interviewing techniques.
- Has the potential to convert into a full-time career.

### How Do I Get Started?
